BOOK REVIEWS:

Six book reviews were submitted to round out the issue. Bob has not yet informed me which reviews will be included.

Quarterly Report for BASOR Report to the Executive Committee and ASOR Board of Trustees November 2011 Jim Weinstein

BASOR 363 (August 2011): Issue came out in late September.

BASOR 364 (November 2011): Issue will have five articles and a selection of book reviews. As of November 10, three articles were in first proofs, while the remaining two had just been sent to Eisenbrauns for typesetting. The book reviews are all in first proofs. The editor expects the issue to go to the printer on December 8 or 9 and to be out around Christmas.

BASOR 365 (February 2012): It is unclear at the moment whether this will be the first issue to appear in color, or the last issue to be printed in black and white. We have several promising manuscripts under consideration that have only black and white illustrations, but it was not known as of November 10 whether all of these papers would be accepted, revised, and ready for publication in the February issue; their publication may have to be stretched out over the February and May issues. If they are all accepted and ready for publication for the February issue, that issue will be printed in black and white. I expect to make a decision on this matter by Thanksgiving.

BASOR 366 (May 2012) and 367 (August 2012): About a dozen manuscripts are already out for review or will be submitted shortly for consideration for these two issues.

BASOR 368 (November 2012): Still planned as a theme issue. Seven manuscripts are scheduled for submission for this issue by December 31.. This issue may become problematic, not because the editor is concerned that the manuscripts won't come in, but because the number of manuscripts and their planned length may not fit within a 96-page limit for the journal. The issue was planned as a 104- or 112-page issue; cutting it back to 96 pages (as now mandated by ASOR) may be very difficult, if not impossible. The editor therefore requests that ASOR approve sufficient funds to allow BASOR to have one 128-page issue in 2012 (i.e., the four issues would be 96, 96, 96, and 128 pages, respectively).

The editor will be proposing to COP at the annual meeting that BASOR transition to semiannual production - i.e., two issues would be published at 192 pages each. The reasons for this proposed change have been explained before, but will be detailed again in the editor's presentation to COP for transmission to the EC and board of trustees.

At the BASOR editorial board meeting in San Francisco, the members will consider ideas for improving the format of BASOR. The current format of the journal has been fine for a black-and-white publication, but this is the time to look at whatever improvements we may be able to make to the journal's appearance and usefulness when we go to color. The move to JSTOR in 2012 also mandates that we look at such possibilities as open access publication of data and embedded links within articles. The current VP of COP, the former VP of COP, and Jim Eisenbraun have all been invited to participate in the editorial board meeting in order to offer their contributions to the discussion.
