# Report of the Chair

The activities of the Committee on Publication during the past year have focused on two efforts

- 1) Supporting the new Editor of Near Eastern Archaeology, Thomas Schneider, in the transition, in his rebuilding the NEA Editorial Board, and in his reorganization of NEA's editorial process.
- 2) Supporting Jim Weinstein's reshaping of the Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research to a full-color, semi annual publication.

Details of these activities are in the Editors' contributions which are the core of this report to the Executive Committee. As a consequence of this focus, this Chair's Report will be short.

While it is too early to properly assess the effects this may have on subscriptions or on the kind and quality of manuscripts submitted to any of the journals, there are many anecdotal indications of broad approval of the move to full access digital publication, even while some readers continue to prefer to receive paper in the mail.

Kevin Cooney continues to organize promotions associates with ASOR's JSTOR content, and in association with ASOR's social media efforts.

There is considerable concern in COP on the submission of thematic groupings of articles to the journals and the complications on working these into the publication schedule without long delays for either the themed issues, or for other articles in the queue. We continue to seek useful solutions including the idea of reviving the dormant BASOR Supplement series, or exploiting the Annual as a venue. No immediately satisfactory solution has yet been proposed. That ASOR Journals attract more high quality manuscripts than can be accommodated in the normal course of production is encouraging and we continue to seek solutions to solve the problem of increasing backlogs.

Communication remains problematic in many regards. In the coming year I will work with COP towards solutions satisfactory to all parties. This having been said, I wish to express my continuing thanks to all members of COP, and to the Editors in particular, for their thoughtful collegial counsel and the careful and patient explanation of their concerns as the first year of my Chair-ship comes to an end. Likewise, the Boston staff, especially Kevin Cooney and Andy Vaughn have been very helpful as I learn the history and process of publications at ASOR.

No items are being brought forward to the Executive Committee for action at this time.

### Editor's Report: Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research

BASOR 367 (August 2012): Sent to printer on August 30, issue delayed at printer, finally mailed to subscribers on October 3.

BASOR 368 (November 2012): Four articles plus book reviews plus possibly an In Memoriam contribution for Frank Cross (if received on time) will appear in this 128-page issue. Two articles and the reviews have already been typeset as of October 26, the third article is being typeset now, and the manuscript for the fourth article is set to go to Carol on October 28 for copyediting. Issue will go to the printer in early December, will be out by Christmas.

BASOR 369 (Spring 2013): First semiannual issue of journal, will be 256 pages in length, will have a new design (new covers, new table of contents, new width of text columns, new standard font). Entire issue is already filled with articles that have been through peer review and have either been revised or are in the process of revision, will also have books reviews and an In Memoriam contribution on Gus Van Beek. Updated Institutions for Contributions for 2013 and later issues will be posted on ASOR website as soon as new procedures are finalized with Eisenbrauns.

BASOR 370 (Fall 2013): Second semiannual issue of journal for 2013, will be 256 pages in length and will be devoted to a theme issue on Iron Age and post-Iron Age Cyprus. Guest editors are Maria Iakovou and Derek Counts. All but one paper and the Introduction have already been through initial review and are currently in revision.

BASOR 371 (Spring 2014): Will be 256 pages in length and will contain independent articles (some of which are already out for review) and book reviews.

BASOR 372 (Fall 2014): Will be 256 pages in length and is tentatively set to contain a theme issue as well as a series of shorter papers in memory of Frank Cross (the guest editors for the latter being Sidnie White Crawford and Walter Aufrecht).

BASOR 373 (Spring 2015): Based on manuscripts already in hand as well as papers promised for submission later this fall, expect to start considering papers for 2015 early in 2013.

- 4. The goal for NEA 75.2-4 was to diversify the contents of the individual issues and to also increase the number of manuscripts per issue. I have been aiming at five articles per issue and 2-3 book reviews.
