

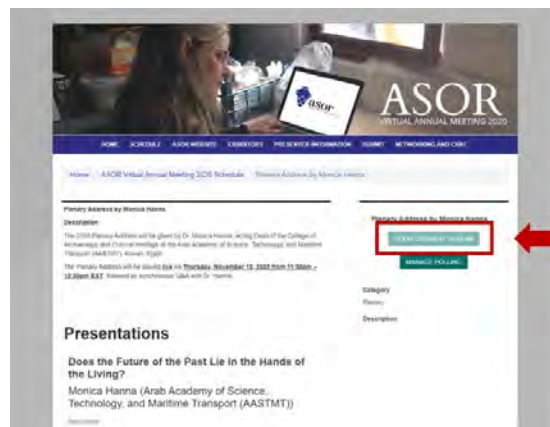
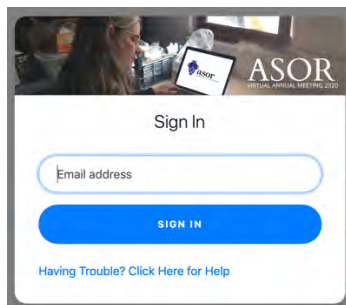

The live/online meetings will take place Thursday–Sunday, November 12–15 & November 19–22, beginning at 11:00am EST each day.

5 Easy Steps for a Successful Virtual Annual Meeting (hint: do number 1 now)

- 1) [Test your e-mail login on this page as soon as possible](#). The first time you open the Online Schedule you will be asked to enter your e-mail address. The site will verify that you are registered, and you will be asked to check your e-mail for a message to complete your login. The e-mail will come from jaredkoller@asor.org and will contain a link to click that gives you full access to the Online Schedule.



On the day of your live session, you will navigate to your session on the schedule. Then click on the highlighted button to access your zoom room.

The button text will change to "Join room" 15 minutes prior to the start of your session.

All chairs, presenters, and attendees will use the same button to access live sessions. Attendees will be placed in a waiting room until the session begins
