| Motivation | A clear statement of why the applicant has chosen to join this project. Full points for a well- reasoned and compelling description of why they have joined this project. | 10 |

Variable points depending on apparent severity of financial need, and the implications of the applicant's financial need for their ability to participate in their chosen project. | 20 |
| Academic Background | A description of a current or past degree program in archaeology or related field, or in an archaeological specialty to the fieldwork. Full points for a clear description of a relevant academic history in archaeology or related disciplines. Fewer points for weaker statement or less-relevant academic preparation. Reviewers are encouraged to award partial points if student is applying from a school where advising or coaching for articulating "academic background" would be hard to receive. | 10 |
| Academic, Career, and Project Goals | A description of a career plan relevant to this field experience. How will this experience advance your career goals? Full points for well-reasoned explanation of a career path that will benefit from this experience. Fewer for weaker statements or less clear career trajectories. | Project Goals or Research Objectives | A description of the project they are joining. Full points for a thorough understanding of project research aims, cultural/geographic/chronological situation, and plan of work for 2022 season. Fewer points for descriptions that do not show evidence of understanding the overall project and its aims. Reviewers are encouraged to award partial points if student is applying from a school where advising or coaching for articulating "project goals" would be hard to receive. | 10 |

| Contribution to BA or MA Thesis | A description of how this project will help with data collection or skill-building relevant to the applicant's degree program, thesis, dissertation, or postdoctoral project. This need not be an applicant's dissertation field site – maybe a field school is required for graduation, or they need to learn how to analyze pottery for an MA thesis. Lots of latitude here for reviewers, and reviewers are encouraged to award partial points if student is applying from a school where this type of opportunity is not encouraged or possible. | 5 |
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| Contribution to Fieldwork Project | A description of how the applicant will contribute to the project. Even as a first-time field school student, applicants should be able to describe what they will be doing while in the field, and how it will contribute to the overall project goals. Lots of latitude here for reviewers, and reviewers are encouraged to award partial points if student is applying from a school where this information would be hard to obtain. For graduate and post-doc applicants: 5 points for being excavation supervisor; 6-10 points for more substantial staff role. | 10 |

FIELDWORK SCHOLARSHIPS DISTRIBUTION CRITERIA

- Roughly equal proportions of undergraduate, graduate, and postdoctoral fellowships will be awarded. For example, if we are able to award 10 fellowships in a given year, and receive 60 undergraduate applications, 30 graduate applications, and 10 postdoctoral applications, we will award fellowships to the top 6 undergraduates, top 3 graduate students, and top 1 postdoctoral fellow. However, we will also take into account the number of fellowships offered to each project (see next point).
- In any given year, no one project will receive more than 2 fieldwork participation scholarships unless there are sufficient funds available to award 1 or 2 scholarships to every project where there were up to 2 viable applications. This distribution criterion may mean that if the three most highly ranked undergraduates from the whole pool are on one project, only the top 2 of those students will be awarded funds. This does not mean that all projects are guaranteed funding, however. It does mean that given availability of funds, scholarships will be spread across as many ASOR-affiliated projects as possible even if that means that higher ranked applicants are not funded.
 - Note: Hazor and Tell el-Hesi receive donor-specified awards. Thus, those projects may receive up to two additional scholarships in addition to the donor-specified awards (for 2022—one for Hesi and five for Hazor). In other words, the donor-specified minimums do not count as the maximum of two scholarships.
- Project directors should be aware of these ranking criteria and advise their students accordingly on how to craft successful essays.
- Country distribution: there should be reasonable distribution between countries even if that means that some applicants with higher scores are not funded.
 - The country distribution should be a high-level picture. Some scholarships funds are designated for a particular country, and those should not add to the total scholarships for students working in a particular country. For example, the Dana Scholarships are designated for Israel, but that should not mean that students in Israel get 12 scholarships in addition to an even distribution for each country.
