

"From a previous survey from several years ago, we started with a set of GPS points that had a high potential EBA yield. We spent the first few days of the trip driving to these points and conducting a basic cardinal survey at each one. Based on the quantity of EBA artifacts we found on the surface, such as characteristic potsherds and lithics, we will now be able to identify the most promising locations for potential EBA settlements."

"At our mountain-top site in central Turkey, the Kerkenes Project uses of the unique nature of the site as a stage to combine cutting edge methods with traditional archaeology and the 2022 field season allowed for both geophysical survey and traditional excavation. Our project, ongoing for almost three decades, brings together an international, interdisciplinary team that includes local stakeholders who have excavated at the site since the 1990s, students from Australia, Canada, the Netherlands, Spain, Turkey, and the United States, and Turkish experts from across the country and world."
