Dining


The Hilton Chicago is home to four restaurants and bars offering a variety of options for meals.

<u>Herb N' Kitchen</u> is an urban market that offers Starbucks coffee, baked goods, artisan salads and sandwiches, and many other gourmet bites. Guests can place orders ahead of time and either have it delivered to their room or schedule a pick-up time. Their hours of operation are 6am-11pm Monday through Thursday, and 6am-12am on Friday and Saturday.

<u>720 South Bar and Grill</u> is a combined restaurant and bar with different selections based on the time of day. <u>720 South Grill</u> offers a daily full breakfast buffet and an a la carte lunch menu during the daytime hours, and 720 South Bar provides a menu of burgers and light bites as well as <u>cocktails</u> and a wine selection in the evening.



Getting Around

Public transportation is the most convenient and cheapest option for navigating Chicago. While many locations are within walking distance, the CTA provides bus routes as well as the "L" trains. The CTA website offers a trip planner to route the most convenient directions to your desired destination.



If you are flying into O'Hare Airport, take the CTA Blue Line train to the Jackson stop and walk 0.6 miles southeast to arrive at the Hilton Chicago. If you are flying into Midway Airport, take the CTA Orange Line train to the Roosevelt stop and walk 0.5 miles north to arrive at the Hilton Chicago.

Please be aware that, due to road construction, there will be increased traffic flow and delays from O'Hare Airport to Chicago.

There are also taxis and rideshares available throughout the city, but those prices may differ depending on the time of day.

Chicago Highlights

While in Chicago, enjoy free admission to the Field Museum at the Museum Campus as well as the Institute for the Study of Ancient Cultures (ISAC) Museum at the University of Chicago.

The Field Museum and the ISAC Museum will be offering free admission to ASOR Annual Meeting attendees from November 15-21. Attendees should present their ASOR Name Badge at the Admissions Desk. 
