The grant funds were used for maintaining the Madaba Archaeological Park West and for school children's classes on their cultural heritage, collaboratively undertaken by the Petra National Trust (PNT). This is a pilot program held in the current Madaba Archaeological Museum with 15 students in each of three-four classes per year.

Husban Culture and Heritageis a local history book authored by Abdullah Abdulazeese Al-Masha'lah. It was published in 2022 in Arabic and English and offers a local account of the agricultural know-how, crafts, and wisdom of past generations of the contemporary Ajarmah families of Hisban. The book also offers a local perspective on archaeological discoveries at the site. As with the above-mentioned children's book, the project of producing the book was initiated and supervised by the writer and AlRaqeem, with funding provided in part by the ASOR Geraty Endowment. The book has been distributed for free to local residents and is available for purchase in local bookstores.
